The First Symposium in Asia

The International Federation for Choral Music, IFCM, organizes every three years a one-week event in cooperation with a national choral organization or a committee in a host country. The purpose of a world symposium is to promote artistic excellence, cooperation and exchange worldwide by bringing together the finest choirs and choral leaders for performances, seminars, workshops and concerts.

The 7th World Symposium in Kyoto, Japan will be the first in this region of Asia (although IFCM recognizes a very large region called Asia-South Pacific) and Sydney must be counted into the South Pacific region when a WS happened there in 1996.


Each World Symposium should have its own character: I do hope that we will hear good choral music from Japan, China, Korea, Taiwan, Singapore, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Australia, New Zealand and many more nations in the region. But I also hope to be totally surprised by the choral sound

of a nation I never heard from before. I understand from visits to some of the countries in this region that we Europeans have much to expect and learn from the choral community in the ASP region!

I know from my own experience that now and then I have to reevaluate art and artistic expressions. I do think that Kyoto, this old imperial city, will bring us something new and unexpected that will make my choral world change a bit. Welcome to WS7 in Kyoto!

In summer 2005 Kyoto will become the "City of Chorus!"

The World Symposium on Choral Music takes place once every three years in a country representing a different geographical region each time. The first Symposium graced Vienna, the City of Music, for which 18 choirs from 13 nations were invited to participate, including the Kyoto Academy Choir (director: Hiroshi Kuwayama) from Japan.

Although there were choirs at this Symposium, a document at the time stated, "Hundreds of choral conductors from all over the world come together for seminars and concerts where they meet the best choirs of the world with their conductors and leading choral instructors," we know it as a symposium meant for choral conductors. We also heard that the official language was not fixed at the first and second Symposia and the languages used differed from one seminar to another.

From then, the International Federation for Choral Music, the organizer, made English the official language of the Symposium and incorporated practical workshops and many concerts

into the Symposium to encourage a greater participation of both conductors and singers.

The Kyoto Symposium will feature 34 choirs and 30 lecturers, in 13 concerts and 41 workshops / seminars. We expect 3,800 people from 60 countries / regions of the world to take part, with an estimated gross participation of 32,000 persons in the concerts to be held during the Symposium period. In the summer of 2005, Kyoto will transform itself into the "City of Chorus."

International Federation for Choral Music

Established in 1982 to promote communication of choral musicians in the world. The organization engages in a number of projects, including the planning and organizing of the World Symposium on Choral Music, regional symposia, choral conducting master classes, the World Youth Choir, the choral database "MUSICA" and ChoralNet website. They also publish and distribute the International Choral Bulletin, the World Choral Census, and Cantemus, an international collection of choral repertoire. The IFCM has set aside a day to promote peace through choral singing - the World Day of Choral Singing; and is active as the organization officially representing choral music on the International Music Council of the UNESCO. To date, 79 countries/regions are members of the IFCM.

Japan Choral Association

The Japan Choral Association was established in 1948 as a nationwide body of amateur choirs and incorporated in 1970. Its members consist of prefectural choral associations across the country that comprise about 5,000 choirs, including those of junior and senior high schools, universities, workplaces, mothers, juniors and the community. The number of choir members totals some 150,000. The Association engages in projects like chorus competitions, mothers' and junior chorus festivals on a nationwide scale. Also, the Japan Choral Music Center set up in 1979 is used by choir members as a library specializing in choral singing.





WORLD CHORAL EXPO

OPEN SINGING

A special symposium program that offers everyone the chance to sing selections of world music every morning, to warm up our hearts and voices. Each day's program will begin in this way under the direction of Gary Graden (Sweden), with special quest conductors each morning.



WORKSHOP/SEMINAR SESSIONS

Specialists in and composers of choral music will be invited from around the world as lecturers. All 41 sessions are planned based on four concepts: "For directors," "For choirs," "For composers" and "For ethnomusicologists". With Kyoto International Conference Hall as the venue, four lectures will run concurrently. There will also be JCA sessions on "Japanese choral music".

SYMPOSIUM CONCERTS

The Symposium Concerts will feature 34 top-level choirs and vocal ensembles from Europe, Africa, North America, South America, Oceania, and Asia, beginning and ending with Gala Concerts. The Kyoto Concert Hall, with wonderful acoustics, will serve as the concert venue. Special Concerts include the *BBC Singers* and *Bach Collegium Japan*.

WORLD CHORAL EXPO

Such choral music-related products as scores, books, CDs, DVDs, PC software, folk instruments, audio equipment, etc. will be displayed. The World Choral Expo will also furnish information on international choral festivals and competitions.

Okoshiyasu Concerts (Open Concerts)

These concerts have been designed to provide an opportunity for non-invited choral groups to perform. From 12:00 p.m. during the daily mid-day break, choirs will perform at the Kyoto International Conference Hall. Details will be announced on the website at http://www.jcanet.or.jp/wscm/*Okoshiyasu means "Welcome" in a Kyoto dialect.

Community Concerts


These concerts have been designed to provide a place to deepen exchange between choral groups invited from around the world and Japanese choral groups including local residents. The concerts will be held in public venues in Kyoto and its environs over six days from July 28 through August 2.

JCA Junior Chorus Festival 2005

The Japan Choral Association holds the Junior Chorus Festival for children's choirs every summer. It usually comprises of the *Ateliers for children* and the *Festival concert*. The Festival in 2005 will tie up with the 7th World Symposium on Choral Music and create a stage together with children's choirs from the world. The concert will be on Sunday afternoon, July 31.

JCA Okasan (Mothers) Chorus Concert

The Mothers Choruses are popular, flourishing and strongly active in Japan. The Japan Choral Association would like to offer a glimpse of this unique activity to the world. The concert will be on Sunday evening, July 31.



Japan sends a message - "Songs unite people of the world"!

The Symposium Executive Committee invited Ryuichi Sakamoto, internationally known for musical activities with his band YMO and his score for the film "The Last Emperor," to compose a theme song for the Kyoto Symposium. A piece enjoyable for all and allowing 150,000 "choral people of Japan" to greet Symposium participants coming from all over the world... Sakamoto gladly agreed.

The theme song will be sung at every occasion throughout the Symposium, starting with the opening gala concert. The theme song has been arranged for and will be sung in various voicings and orchestrations - there will be an *a cappella* version, an arrangement for choir and organ, and a version for solo voice.

The text for this song, also the theme for the 7th Symposium, is: "Cantus populi, cantus mundi. Cantus omnibus unus." (Songs of the people, songs of the world. One song unto all.) Thus, a "song" uniting the people of the world is about to be born.

Ryuichi Sakamoto: Born in Tokyo January 17, 1952. A graduate of the Music Composition Faculty of Tokyo National University of Fine Arts and Music and of the Acoustics Study Faculty of its graduate school. In 1978, he formed the Yellow Magic Orchestra (YMO) with Yukihiro Takahashi and Haruomi Hosono. The trio led the global movement of techno-pop. It disbanded in 1983. The same year, he starred in the film "Merry Christmas, Mr. Lawrence," composing the film score, from there gaining a reputation as an excellent film composer. In 1987, for the film score for "The Last Emperor," in which he also appeared, he received many prizes including an Academy Award for Best Original Score and a Grammy Award for Best Score. He has also collaborated with world famous artists crossing over musical genres. He has released a great number of CDs, his most recent album being "Chasm" released in February 2004. His choral compositions include an opera entitled "Life" (1999) and a chorale entitled "Novel" (text: Ryu Murakami/1982).

A broadcasting choir boasting an 80-year history will give us the flavor of the UK

It is the UK's only professional chamber choir organized by BBC. Its predecessor was "Wireless Chorus," formed in 1924 two years after the start of BBC, to sing in a radio broadcasting program. It is a historic broadcasting choir - in 2004 marks the 80th anniversary of its formation. Its schedule is quite busy with performances in radio and TV in addition to recording and concert activities. Their present Chief Conductor is Stephen Cleobury, also well known as the Music Director of King's College Choir, Cambridge University.

Appropriate for a choir that belongs to a European broadcasting company whose important mission is to introduce contemporary music, the BBC Singers actively give performances of that musical genre. It has premiered many choral pieces such as Poulenc's *Figure humaine*, a familiar piece also in Japan. Its recording of Schönberg's complete works of choral music in collaboration with Pierre Boulez (CBS/present SONY) is a landmark work that contributes to the future. On the other hand, presumably reflecting the musical environment of London where the performance of early music is actively conducted, it has long engaged in performing renaissance and baroque music together with ensembles composed of noted musicians. Its repertoire covers most of the history of choral music from 16th century to the contemporary period.

BBC Singers

In Kyoto, it will hold a special concert on August 1 and appear in the closing gala concert to sing Mozart's *Mass in C minor*. Great expectations are held for the sensitive renditions befitting a British choir.

Bach Collegium Japan

Bach orchestra and choir of world-class achievements in Japan

Masaaki Suzuki, internationally famous for his Bach performances and research, formed an orchestra and choir group of baroque music specialists in 1990.

To re-create the tone of the baroque period and to express the objective of music in religious pieces more vividly, the orchestra uses authentic instruments and adopts the performance style of the era. The choir, while under the direction and guidance of Suzuki, has engaged in a wide range of performing activities, acquiring the power and dramatic expression and making the most of the natural sounds and inflections of the German language.

In 2000, the year commemorating the 250th anniversary of Bach's death, the BCJ was invited to the Santiago Music Festival (Spain), Leipzig-Bach Music Festival (Germany), Melbourne Music Festival (Australia), etc., and performed as the highlight of the festivals, winning high acclaim. The same year, it performed *St Matthew's Passion, St John's Passion* and *Mass B minor* as the main artists of "Bach2000" hosted by the Suntory Hall in Tokyo. Its performance of *St Matthew's Passion* that fell on the anniversary day of Bach's death was televised live throughout the world and generated headlines. It has released many CDs centered on Bach. In particular, its "Bach: Complete Works of Sacred Cantata" series (Sweden BIS label), whose recording started in1994 and continues today, is highly evaluated at home and abroad as "the big project of the century." The BCJ will take center stage at a concert on July 28, 2005 that falls on the 255th anniversary of Bach's demise.



CHOIRS FROMAROUND THE WORLD

The foremost choirs of Europe, Africa, North America, South America, Oceania, and Asia, including Japan, will offer their gala performances on stage at the Symposium Concert.

Audiences will enjoy a global perspective of current choral music in superb acoustic environment of Kyoto Concert Hall.

ASIA SOUTH PACIFIC

AUSTRALIA CANTICUM CHAMBER CHOIR

Emily Cox, Conductor

The Canticum Chamber Choir is a semi-professional chamber choir based in Brisbane, Australia, founded in 1995 by conductor Emily Cox. The Choir promotes the art of the chamber choir to audiences through its diverse repertoire, ranging from renaissance to new compositions by Australian composers. Apart from its own concert series, Canticum has collaborated recently with the Queensland Ballet, Queensland Orchestra and Queensland Youth Symphony Orchestra.

INDONESIA PARAHYANGAN CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY CHOIR Avip Priatna, Conductor


This Choir (PSM UNPAR) was established in 1962 for students to enhance their appreciation for music. PSM UNPAR also performs at official university functions. The Choir has won the Indonesian Choir Competition 3 times and has gained international success by earning 3 Gold medals at the Choir Olympics 2000, and 1st prize at the 8th International Chamber Choir Competition 2003 in Marktoberdorf, Germany.

KOREA THE NATIONAL CHORUS OF KOREA


Chin-Seup Yom, Conductor

The National Chorus, Korea's first professional choir, was founded in 1973. The Chorus performs a wide range of music, from renaissance to contemporary works. It has performed with the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra and with many famous opera singers and soloists. The Chorus hopes to portray the aspirations of the Korean spirit, including the use of the modern melodies and modern techniques.











UNIVERSITY CHOIR OF STELLENBOSCH

PHILIPPINES THE SAN MIGUEL MASTER CHORALE

Eudenice Palaruan, Conductor

The San Miguel Master Chorale was recognized as the Best Choral Group in the recently concluded Aliw Awards. Since its inception in November 2000, the SMMC has premiered various choral works, notably in its critically-acclaimed concert entitled "Landscapes". SMMC has also released a recording together with The San Miguel Philharmonic Orchestra, *The Sacred Works of Ryan Cayabyab*. The SMMC, the country's first professional choir, was established by The San Miguel Foundation for the Performing Arts in the Philippines to set new standards of excellence in the choral arts.

TURKEY ORFEON CHAMBER CHOIR

Elnara Kerimova, Conductor

The Orfeon Chamber Choir was established in 1994 to perform choral music from around the world. The choir also aims to popularize polyphonic music to audiences in Turkey, and to introduce Turkish music to the world. Orfeon has won numerous medals at competitions such as the 1st Choir Olympics in Austria. The group has also performed at a choral festival in Belgium, in a benefit concert for victims of the earthquake in Turkey. Orfeon's story is summarized in the book "Success Stories from Turkey" (2003).

AFRICA AFRICA-USA AFRICAN CHILDREN'S CHOIR

Jamimah Nasanga, Conductor

The Choir, founded in 1984, is composed of African children, many of whom are orphans. The children sing African songs accompanied by ethnic instrumentation. Despite their personal tragedies, the children are radiant with hope, musically gifted and wonderfully entertaining. They have appeared in concerts around the world and have been featured on television and radio, including CBS Good Morning America. The Choir has also performed at the Royal Albert Hall. The goal of the Choir is to raise awareness of the needs of orphaned children in Africa and to raise funds for Music for Life projects.

SOUTH AFRICA UNIVERSITY CHOIR OF STELLENBOSCH

André Van der Merwe, Conductor

The University Choir of Stellenbosch, the oldest university choir in South Africa, is one of the most respected choral groups in the country. André van der Merwe, choirmaster from Cape Town, South Africa has been conductor of the University Choir of Stellenbosch since 2003. He received a B.Drama (Directing) degree from the University of Stellenbosch in 1992.

LATIN AMERICA CUBA ENTREVOCES

Digna Guerra Ramirez, Conductor

Entrevoces, founded in 1981, performs music from renaissance polyphony up to contemporary works, spirituals and gospel music, Latin-American folklore and Cuban music. Entrevoces has performed at choral events around the world, including a performance at the Vatican. In 2000, the Choir participated in the 1st International Choral Festival Cuba-United States in Havana. They have also recorded albums and movie soundtracks, as well as performed on popular TV programs.

GUATEMALA CORO VICTORIA

Julio César Santos Campos, Conductor

The Choir's objective is to teach music to children in Guatemala. Since 1983 they have promoted competitions in which some 10,000 students have participated. The Choir also promotes workshops for choir singers and conductors, acting as a choral school. In 1996 they founded the festival "Enlace Coral"; since then, they have organized 4 festivals for domestic and foreign choral groups. In 2001, the choir recorded a CD of Guatemalan Christmas music, and was awarded "Artist of the Year".

NORTH AMERICA CANADA NATHANIEL DETT CHORALE

Brainerd Blyden-Taylor, Conductor


The Nathaniel Dett Chorale is Canada's first professional choral group dedicated to Afro-centric music of all styles. The Chorale comprises of 21 vocalists whose work stretches beyond the traditional expectations of a classical chamber choir. Since its inception in 1998, the Chorale has performed its uplifting repertoire throughout North America. It has performed at events honouring such leaders as Nelson Mandela, Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Muhammad Ali. Recordings: *Listen to the Lambs: The Music of R. Nathaniel Dett, An Indigo Christmas Line.*

CANADA THE WINNIPEG SINGERS

Yuri Klaz, Conductor

This ensemble, as one of Canada's premier choirs, follows a rich tradition of choral music in Winnipeg. The Winnipeg Singers consist of 24 trained voices, performing music of periods ranging from the Renaissance to the present. They are regularly heard on local and national CBC radio. They have released two recordings *O Praise Ye the Lord* and *Prairie Voices*. In 2003, they performed at the Association of Canadian Choral Conductor's national conference "Podium 2004" in Winnipeg.





USA THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S CHORUS OF NEW YORK CITY Francisco J. Núñez, Conductor

The Young People's Chorus of New York City, the resident choir of the 92nd Street Y, has performed at Carnegie Hall and the White House, as well as illustrious venues such as Smetana Hall, Prague and St. Martin in the Fields, London. The YPC was founded in 1988 with two goals: commitment to musical excellence and providing a place where young people of diverse backgrounds can pursue the study and performance of music. The YPC was recognized for artistic excellence by the US President.

USA SAN FRANCISCO GIRLS CHORUS

Susan McMane, Conductor

Founded in 1978, the Chorus is a regional center for music education and choral training for girls and young women, ages 7 - 18. More than 300 singers participate in this internationally known program. The Chorus' discography includes *Music From the Venetian Ospedali*, rediscovered music written over 2 centuries ago for all-girl choirs of Venetian orphanages. The organization comprises of Chorissima and Virtuose, the concert, recording, and touring ensembles, and the Chorus School training program.

EUROPE DENMARK VOCAL LINE

Jens Johansen, Conductor

Vocal Line is a Danish vocal ensemble established by conductor Jens Johansen in 1991. Vocal Line's 32 singers combine European and Nordic choir traditions with a modern American *a cappella* style to form a unique "World Jazz A Cappella". Johansen is head of the Department of Musicology at the University of Aarhus. He also conducts at the Danish Royal Academy. He has given lectures for conductors and has conducted throughout Europe, including at Cantat XV 2003 in Barcelona. He has published numerous choir arrangements and compositions.

NORWAY OSLO CHAMBER CHOIR

Grete Pedersen, Conductor

The Oslo Chamber Choir is considered one of the leading choirs in Norway. The choir has become particularly famous for its groundbreaking exploration of vocal folk music. They have brought the ancient Norwegian singing tradition called "kveding," usually done by single voices, into innovative choir performances. The choir has also supported humanitarian projects such as a national TV campaign to fight cancer and a concert held in the Oslo Cathedral for Yugoslavian refugees.

GERMANY CANTABILE LIMBURG

Jürgen Fassbender, Conductor

This 18-member group traces its roots to a 1970 boys choir in Limburg. Amazingly, since the formation of Cantabile Limburg, all 18 members have stayed in the group. As a result of this bond, the choir is able to create a truly unique and harmonious "Cantabile sound". The choir's repertoire ranges from classical polyphony to madrigal songs, romantic to modern pieces, including pop and jazz arrangements. They have released a CD called *Männergesang*, featuring a selection of famous male choir pieces.

ITALY I MADRIGALISTI AMBROSIANI

Gianluca Capuano, Conductor

I Madrigalisti Ambrosiani was founded in 1994 with the aim to rediscover great, ancient music and to promote interest in vocal ensemble music. The ensemble specializes in Italian Renaissance and Baroque music. With the help of musicologists, members devote a part of their activity to researching and rediscovering works of forgotten composers.

NETHERLANDS NETHERLANDS YOUTH CHOIR

Wilma ten Wolde, Conductor

Formed in 1996, the Netherlands Youth Choir consists of 20 student female voices. They won 2 prizes in 2001 at the prestigious 31st Choir Festival in Tolosa, Spain: 2nd prize for religious repertoire and 1st prize for secular. They have performed *a cappella* programmes and in productions with professional orchestras such as the New Sinfonietta (2001) and Rotterdam Chamber Orchestra (2003). Each year, an internationally-known choir specialist is invited to do a project with the Choir. Previous guests include Bo Johansson, Daniel Reuss, Bo Holten, and Tōnu Kaljuste.

NORWAY NORDIC VOICES


Nordic Voices is a six-voice *a cappella* ensemble whose singing is a blend of the solo and the unified, the analytical and the affectionate. Their vast repertoire ranges from medieval to modernist music, featuring works of composers from Monteverdi and di Lasso to Ligeti and Berio. In 1999 Nordic Voices won both the top awards in 2 categories at a competition in Tolosa, Spain. In 2002 the ensemble received critical acclaim at The Northern Light Festival in Tromsø. Nordic Voices' first album. *Sense and nonSense* was released in 2003.

RUSSIA VOKALENSEMBLE ANIMA

Victor Smirnov, Conductor

This ensemble consists of 6 male voices - 1 counter tenor, 2 tenors, 1 baritone, and 2 basses. All 6 members are graduates of St. Petersburg Conservatoire. Thanks to the versatile talent of their counter tenor, the vocal range of the group is close to that of a full mixed choir. Choir leader, Victor Smirnov graduated from Glinka Chorus School and then studied conducting at St. Petersburg Conservatoire. He founded Anima in 1992, while still a student at the Conservatoire. "Anima" has recorded 4 CDs combining Russian and French spiritual music with old folk songs.

SLOVENIA CARMINA SLOVENICA

Karmina šilec, Conductor

Carmina Slovenica is both a leading ensemble in the world choir movement and an avant garde vocal group that endeavors to transform choir performances by incorporating dance, theatre, and traditional instruments. Carmina Slovenica's goal is to promote "Music in the service of Peace", via the heritage of Slovenian and international music. In addition to a cappella music, Carmina Slovenica has performed Mahler's Symphony No.8, Pergolesi's Stabat Mater, Orff's Carmina Burana, among others.

SWEDEN SCHOLA GOTHIA

Ulrike Heider, Leader

Schola Gothia, founded in 1999, is a professional female vocal quartet that sings Gregorian chants and polyphonic music of the 14th and 15th centuries. Since the founding of the group, Schola Gothia has toured throughout Sweden and other countries in Europe, appearing in many concerts and festivals for Early Music. All of Schola Gothia's music is performed with traditional notation, music stands, and costumes.

JAPAN

VOCAL ENSEMBLE < EST>

Masao Mukai, Conductor

The Vocal Ensemble <EST> was founded in 1992 in Tsu city by several young adults and students who loved choir singing and were eager to perform Renaissance music. Since 1994 the choir has won many Gold Medals and other awards at many different competitions. During the celebration of the Catholic Church's Holy Year in 1998 EST performed the Contino's *Mass*, a mass that had not been held in over in 450 years. This performance attracted much attention and was broadcast in Italy. The choir has participated in many tours in Japan and overseas.

CHAMBER CHOIR VOX GAUDIOSA

Ko Matsushita, Conductor

Chamber Choir VOX GAUDIOSA was formed in 1996 in Saitama, Japan, and uses music from all ages and countries, especially *a cappella*, in its repertoire. The choir was awarded gold medals for the chamber choir category at the JCA National Choral Competition from 2000 to 2002 and was named Best Choir in 2001 and 2002. The choir held two successful overseas tours in Estonia (2002) and Taiwan (2003). It also participated in The Bela Bartok International Choir Competition (Hungary). The choir has released a CD of Japanese folksongs arranged by Ko Matsushita.

THE LITTLE SINGERS OF TOKYO - LSOT SENIOR & YOUTH CHOIR

Hisae Hasegawa, Conductor

The Little Singers of Tokyo (LSOT) was founded in 1951 by Shinichi Hasegawa and the late Father Paul Annuih to "introduce Renaissance Music to Japanese children". In 1955 LSOT became the Japanese branch of the International Pueri Cantores. Children from age 6 to university students participate in 5 different levels. LSOT's repertoire covers a wide range from Gregorian Chants to contemporary works. The Choir's activities include 2 regular concerts a year as well as domestic and overseas concert tours, performances with orchestras and in operatic theatres. The current Music Director is Hisae Hasegawa, and the Artistic Director is Saeko Hasegawa.

NANIWA CHORALIERS

Keishi Ito, Conductor

The Naniwa Choraliers, founded in 1993 in Osaka, is a male choir whose motto is "to be Smart and Cool". It won gold prizes at the National Choral Competition organized by the Japan Choral Association (including Grand-Prix in 2001) in 1999 - 2002, and Grand-Prix at the Takarazuka International Chorus Competition in 2003 as the Naniwa Choraliers Chamber Ensemble. In 2001, the choir was invited to the Asia South Pacific Symposium on Choral Music held in Singapore. Founder and conductor, Keishi Ito, is one of the leading young choral conductors in Japan. Their repertoire includes standard numbers to the most modern style choir music.

THE LITTLE SINGERS OF TOKYO - LSOT SENIOR & YOUTH CHOIR

JAPAN YOUTH CHOIR

The Japan Youth Choir comprises some 40 young singers who have experienced working with the World Youth Choir and Asian Youth Choir. This group was formed to create an international choir in Japan toward the next generation. The World Youth Choir is an international project organized annually by IFCM and FIJM. The Asian Youth Choir is a musical feature of the Asian Culture Festival as organized by Niigata Prefecture once every two years. Both events are similar in that young vocalists selected by audition take part in music camps and concert tours, thus honing their singing skill and providing occasions for international friendship exchange. The Japan Youth Choir held its first concert during April 2001 in Kobe.



CHOEUR JOYEUX

Tsuneo Takasu, Conductor

Choeur joyeux, a male chorus group, was founded in October of 1971. They further developed after Michio Takasu became their permanent conductor. The group is known for proactively using emerging music in addition to past works from Europe, outside Europe, and Japan. The group's concerts have featured composers from throughout Europe and Japan. They have been awarded many prizes including the Aichi Prefecture Culture Prize of Sophisticated Arts and Culture in 1985 and the Gold Medal for Adult Participants for the National Competition of JCA National Choral Competition in 1985 -1988, and 1997.

KYOTO ECHO CHOIR

Keiichi Asai, Conductor

The Kyoto Echo Choir was formed in 1963 by their principal conductor and music director Keiichi Asai. They first took part in the Japan Choral Association National Choral Competition in 1970 and have won gold medals there every year from 1980 to 1999. The Choir holds original concerts every two or three years, and has given performances with such well-known orchestras and conductors as the Orchestre de Paris conducted by Semyon Bychkov and the New Japan Philharmonic under Seiji Ozawa. The choir has made several recordings and also performs overseas where it has also received many awards.

TAJIMI CHILDREN'S CHOIR

Nobuaki Tanaka, Conductor

The Tajimi Children's Choir was founded in 1973. They perform classic, contemporary, and jazz concerts as well as annual UNICEF Christmas concerts every year. The choir has also made concert tours to Singapore, Australia, South Korea, and the United States.

THE TARO SINGERS

Hiroshi Satoi, Conductor

The Taro Singers were founded by Hiroshi Satoï, giving their first performance in 1995. In their 4th season, they performed Rossini's *Missa Brevis Solemnis*, and began to sing *a cappella* works and are now appreciated as a unique professional mixed chamber choral society in Japan. They have some subscription concerts in major Japanese cities, and were well-received at a concert tour to Europe. The critically acclaimed group gets its name from a play on the conductor's last name, which means *taro* in Japanese, because the group hopes to become as popular around the world as this food plant is.

GREEN WOOD HARMONY

Kunio Imai, Conductor

Sendai, the "City of Trees," was burned to the ground during World War II. Green Wood Harmony was established in 1948 to bring back the beauty of the city through choral music. Excellent conductors, including present conductor Kunio Imai, have made great strides in developing the choir, which takes its name from Mendelssohn's "Green Woods." The choir currently has about 70 members and gives regular concerts and participates in competitions throughout the year, where it has received many awards. The repertoire ranges from Renaissance and Baroque period music to contemporary pieces.

INTERPRETATION OF J.S. BACH'S MOTETS MASAAKI SUZUKI, JAPAN

J.S. Bach, who adopted the traditional motet form and brought it to new heights, created an intense contrapuntal world with his unique and distinctive musical language. It is no longer merely occasional music but has a theological and musical structure that cannot be performed without understanding the relationship between the text and music. The background of his works and a contemporary approach to performing them will be explored.

CHORAL CONDUCTING MASTER CLASS - EUROPEAN CHORAL MUSIC OF THE 19TH CENTURY DAN-OLOF STENLUND, SWEDEN

German Romantic composers Mendelssohn, Bruckner and Brahms composed choral music creating unique traditions and bequeathed to us masterpieces of architectural sound structure. Students will learn how to conduct choral ensembles to build performances rich in harmony, and acquire the skills to effectively interpret scores. The class also will provide students with opportunities to learn fine pieces by Japanese composers.

CHORAL MUSIC IN LATIN AMERICA

EDSON CARVALHO, BRAZIL

The workshop will present common rhythms in Latin America and their use within the choral idiom. It will also introduce the repertoire of choral art music in Latin America in the last decade.

CHORAL MUSIC IN AFRICA

1) RITUAL SONG: SINGING TOGETHER THE TRADITIONAL CHORAL SONG OF THE BANTU LUPWISHI MBUYAMBA, MOZAMBIQUE

While traditional choral songs handed down in the eastern central part and southern part of Africa are demonstrated, opportunities will be provided to unfold discussion on the choral music varieties in the world, contributing to the multilateral creation of cultures.

2) CHORAL SINGING IN AFRICA - MANY NATIONS WITH MANY CULTURES ANNEMARIE VAN DER WALT, SOUTH AFRICA

The workshop will deal with such themes as historical influences on choral music in Africa, complex composition of the different ethnic groups with many different languages, and choral singing style and repertoire

CHORAL MUSIC IN EASTERN EUROPE - CHORAL MUSIC OF ORTHODOX CHURCH THEODORA PAVLOVITCH, BULGARIA

The workshop will present the history and the modern trends of orthodox music -

starting from Byzantium, the cradle of Orthodoxy through Medieval and subsequent traditions of different Eastern European countries to their contemporary church music.

VOCAL SOUND BUILDING: DEVELOPMENT OF THE YOUNG SINGING VOICE YOSHIHISA MATTHIAS KINOSHITA, GERMANY

Every child is born with a natural gift to sing. So I welcome every child if he or she wants to learn to sing. I want to show how to develop the voice and the sound of young voices (between six and sixteen) within a choir by using this natural gift with which children are blessed.

JAPANESE CHORAL MUSIC WITH THE COMPOSERS 1) A COMPOSER'S PERSPECTIVE: CHARACTERISTICS OF JAPANESE FOLKSONGS AND THEIR REGENERATION IN CHORAL MUSIC AKIRA MIYOSHI, JAPAN

In Japan, we have a large number of choral selections composed with motifs provided by folksongs handed down through the generations, as found in all nations. When writing such music, composers encounter such problems as how to express their nation's inherent life using contemporary and universal phrases of music. In this workshop, I will delve into such problems through my own experiences of creating music from Japanese folk songs, as common to all contemporary music including the choral variety.

2) CHORAL MUSIC AS A CATEGORY OF THE WESTERN MUSIC IN JAPAN YORIAKI MATSUDAIRA, JAPAN

The workshop will introduce the process by which choral music was established in Japan, and the present state where choral music is on the rise in Japan. However, except in rare cases like "Sakura," Japanese choral music is rarely included in the repertoire of foreign choruses. It appears that the main reason for this is in the extreme uniqueness of the Japanese language. For us, the Swedish technique, the sound-text composition, must be very suggestive

JOSQUIN DES PREZ AND THE FLEMISH SCHOOL IN THE RENAISSANCE PERIOD FLORIAN HEYERICK, BELGIUM

Josquin des Prez was a celebrated composer of the Renaissance and one of the most influential figures in the history of Western music. Born in the region of Hainaut (in present-day Belgium), he probably received his musical training at Cambrai, France. His musical style was the product of two cultures: the north, where he was born and educated and to which he later returned, and the south, where he reached artistic maturity and spent many of the most productive years of his life. The techniques and styles of the two regions coexisting in his music will be clarified.

JAPANESE CHORAL MUSIC WITH THE COMPOSERS

1) RYUKYU SCALES AND HEESHI (FORMULAIC REFRAINS WITH OKINAWAN DIALECTS) IN OKINAWAN TRADITIONAL FOLK SONGS

TORU NAKAMURA, JAPAN

We can find the fundamental nature and the characteristics of Okinawan traditional folk songs in their own scale and the heeshi-parts (formulaic refrains with Okinawan dialects) definitely. It has been pointed out that there are no folk songs in the mainland of Japan that have the same pattern as the Ryukyu scale, but rather that kind of scale is similar to the folksongs of the Yunnan region in southern China, or to those of Gamelan music in Indonesia. Heeshi do not merely work as cheering voices but are sung as the most emotional parts without the narrative meaning of verses. In the workshop, these attractive characteristics of Okinawan folk songs will be sought through the performance of Nakamura's choral work "Mahee-no-inori".

2) ON HETEROPHONY

AKIRA NISHIMURA, JAPAN

Nishimura will speak about heterophonic music in East Asia including Japan, as well as his musical experiments of heterophony in choral music.

CHORAL MUSIC OF ALFRED SCHNITTKE

ALEXANDER IVASHKIN, UK

Choral music is a significant and important part of Schnittke's output as a composer. The talk will be illustrated by recordings of Schnittke's unknown early choral pieces (he was studying as chorus master at the music college in Moscow in late 1940s), as well as his well known masterpieces 'Requiem', 'Concerto for mixed chorus', 'Penetential Psalms', 'Faust Cantata'. There will also be a discussion of the parallels between the traditions of Russian Orthodox Church choral music and Schnittke's choral works, as well as relations between Schnittke's film music and his choral compositions. As well, the session will also show the development of Schnittke's musical language through his choral works.

CHORAL MUSIC IN ASIA

1) KOREAN LANGUAGE AND KOREAN CHORAL MUSIC

GEONGYONG LEE, KOREA

Language is the prerequisite component of vocal music. The essential role of the language apparently applies with Korean choral music as well. The various peculiarities of the language could be the handicap or advantages imposed on the music. Thus, the successful application of the character of Korean language is of significant importance to the choral music. The purpose of my presentation is to show the interaction between Korean language and Korean choral music, with specific examples.

2) PASIBUTBUT AS A HARMONIC OVERTONE PRAYER SONG RUNG-SHUN WU, TAIWAN

Pasibutbut is a song sung by the Bununs, an ethnic minority in Taiwan, who pray for an abundant harvest of millet, which is their bread of life. In recent years, people regard this pasibutbut as a "choral song in 8 parts." This is probably because, while it is sung, it is heard like chorus in 8 parts, though in reality the singers are separated into 4 parts only. It is believed among the Bununs that if they sing the pasibutbut in perfect harmony, their heavenly God will then bless the Bununs with an abundant harvest of millet. The workshop will deal with this prayer song.

Puppet manipulation, joruri recitation and shamisen music, each of which requires many years of training to master. The dolls that appear in a bunraku puppet show are about half life-size. Their eyes move, their eyebrows rise in surprise, their mouths open and shut and their hands and arms gesture gracefully and realistically.

Mt.Hiei

July 27 (Wednesday) 13:00 – 17:00 JPY5,500 per person Mt. Hiei & Enryakuji Temple: Located on the top of Mt. Hiei and blessed with commanding views of both Kyoto and Lake Biwa, Enryakuji Temple boasts ten art objects designated as national treasures and over fifty more objects listed as important cultural properties. Moreover, Enryakuji Temple is renowned as the training grounds for many of the great Buddhist leaders in Japan's long history, including such

famous priests such as Eisai, Dogen and Nichiren. The temple is said to have been founded in 788 and is now the main temple of the Tendai sect of Buddhism.

Tamba Winery

July 31 (Sunday) 9:00 - 17:00 JPY8,800 per person (Lunch included)

Tachikui Sue-no-Sato (pottery making experience): Visit a pottery in Tachikui and enjoy making the pottery by

yourself, you will explore the world of Tanba Pottery. Tanba Pottery is counted as one of the ancient six potteries in Japan with Seto, Tokoname, Shigaraki, Bizen and Echizen, with its origination being as far back as the last Heian-the early Kamakura period (1180-1230).

Tamba winery: Tamba is a small town of about 8,100 people, situated in the middle of Kyoto Prefecture, on the plateau 150-300 meters above sea level. For its climate and soil, Tamba is known for producing high quality food such as matsutake mushrooms, chestnuts and black beans for its climate and soil. Visit will be made to a local winery in Tamba to feel and taste the blessings of nature.

Kyoto Soundscape Tour

July 31 (Sunday) 9:00 - 17:00 JPY7,500 per person (Lunch included)

Have you ever though of the place where you could feel the harmony of music other than at the concert halls? Walking in the town of Kyoto, you would feel its particular harmony of music throughout the town. You could sharpen up your fifth sence in listening to the small sounds of daily lives in Kyoto, like Sutra-chanting in the old temple, lively conversation at the Nishiki-Koji Market which has been called as the kitchen of Kyoto.

Nishiki Market: This is the largest market in Kyoto with well over 125 shops that sell all sort of produce to both wholesale buyers and individual shoppers. The market has a history of over 400 years and also continues for 400 meters in length, though rarely expanding to more than two meters in width. It is called as the Kitchen of Kyoto, and is always a busy place Shokokuji Temple: The temple ranks second among the five chief temples of the Rinzai sect. The original buildings and many of the treasures were almost totally destroyed by fire during the Age of Civil Wars in the 15th Century. It was not until more than a century had

elapsed that Toyotomi Hideyori (1593-1615), son of Hideyoshi, began reconstruction work on

dragon groans when visitors' clap beneath it echoes.



Kibune & Kurama

July 31, (Sunday) 9:00 - 17:00 JPY15,000 per person (Kawadoko Lunch included) JPY10,000 per person (Japanese style set menu Lunch included)

Kibune: Up in this area, average temperature is lower by about 4 degrees Celsius than in the city center. Also known as the source of Kamo River in Kyoto, It has always been a nice summering place. Setting up a riverbed over a mountain stream, enjoying Kawadoko-ryori (Japanese cuisine enjoyed over or by the stream) savoring the cool air is a summer seasonal specialty.

Kurama: Kurama was once an isolated village of foresters. Now a Kyoto suburb, it still retains an untamed feeling, a quality of faith and ascetic training. It is also known as the legends of Tengu (long-nozed goblin).

Noh

July 31 (Sunday) 9:00 - 13:00 JPY8,500 per person Noh: Noh is performed on a bare, three-sided wood stage roofed like a shrine. Originated remotely in China, Kanze Kanami (1333 - 1384) established the foundation for Noh plays as an art, while his son Zeami (1363-1443) brought them to fruition. The highest principle of Noh plays lies in yugen (subtlety), which is akin to the graceful beauty of the ladies and noblemen of the Court. Noh is a musical drama

accompanied by utai (chanted texts), orchestra called hayashi – which consists of flute, small drum, medium-sized drum and large drum-, and dancing called mai.



Juni - Hitoe August1 (Monday)

9:00 - 12:00 JPY9,400 per person Juni - Hitoe: The Juni-hitoe (twelve unlined robes) was the style of dress for women of the nobility during the Heian Period (785-1185). It was a time of complicated court intrigues with much emphasis on the elaborate plots of court. The women would wear up to twenty-five different layers of robes and this mode of dress was referred to as juni-hitoe. The emphasis of the outfits was on the arrangement of the

layers of color. Wearing juni- hitoe and court dances will be demonstrated.

Zen

August1 (Monday) 9:00 - 12:00 JPY6,500 per person Zen Meditation: There are three main Zen sects and all place emphasis on zazen (sitting meditation) and self - help. As developed in the great Zen temples of Kyoto during the feudal era, the rigorous mindset and uncluttered aesthetics of Zen have had a profound influence on Japanese culture at large. Experience meditation at Tenryuji

Temple, which boasts an exceptional Zen-style garden from the Muromachi Period. The temple heads the Tenryuji school of the Rinzai Zen Buddhist sect.





GENERAL INFORMATION

OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

The Official language of the Symposium is English. All workshops and seminars will be held in English.

PASSPORT AND VISA

To visit Japan, you must have a valid passport. A visa is required for citizens of countries that do not have visa-exempt agreements with Japan. Please contact the nearest Japanese Embassy or Consulate for visa requirements.

DUTY FREE IMPORT

Personal effects and professional equipment can be brought into Japan duty free as long as the customs officer deems their contents and quantities reasonable. You can also bring in 400 cigarettes, 500 grams of tobacco or 100 cigars; 3 bottles of alcoholic beverages; 2 ounces of perfume; and gifts and souvenirs whose total market price is less than 200,000 yen or its equivalent. There is no allowance for tobacco or alcoholic beverages for persons aged 19 years or younger. Strictly prohibited are firearms and other types of weapons, and narcotics.

INSURANCE

The organizer cannot accept responsibility for accidents that might occur. Delegates are encouraged to purchase travel insurance before leaving their home country. Insurance plans typically cover accidental loss of belongings, medical costs in case of injury or illness, and other possible risks of international travel.

CLIMATE

The temperature in Kyoto during the period of the Symposium ranges between 23-33 degrees Celsius.

CURRENCY EXCHANGE

Only Japanese yen (¥) is acceptable at regular stores and restaurants. Certain foreign currencies may be accepted at a limited number of hotels, restaurants and souvenir shops. You can buy yen at foreign exchange banks and other authorized money exchangers on presentation of your passport.

TRAVELER'S CHECKS AND CREDIT CARDS

Traveler's checks are accepted only by leading banks and major hotels in principal cities, and the use of traveler's checks in Japan is not as popular as in some other countries. VISA, MasterCard, Diners Club, and American Express are widely accepted at hotels, department stores, shops, restaurants and nightclubs.

TIPPING

In Japan, tips are not necessary anywhere, even at hotels and restaurants.

ELECTRICITY

Electric current is uniformly 100 volts, AC, throughout Japan, but with two different cycles: 50 in eastern Japan including Tokyo and 60 in western Japan including Kyoto and Osaka. Leading hotels in major cities have two outlets of 100 and 220 volts but their sockets usually accept a two-leg plug only.

SHOPPING

Shops and other sales outlets in Japan are generally open on Saturdays, Sundays and national holidays as well as weekdays from 10:00 to 20:00. Department stores, however, are closed during one weekday, differing by store, and certain specialty shops may not open on Sundays and national holidays.
