World Symposium on Choral Music, 23-28 August 2026, Macau, China, *Reimagining the Future*

For six days in August 2026, Macau will be host to one of the biggest events of the International Federation for Choral Music, held with the support of the Macau Choral Arts Association. The theme for the 2026 triennial gathering of the international choral community is *Reimagining the Future* and aims to attract representation from all regions in the world. WSCM 2026 will invite us to reflect on the present, considering what has changed or is in the process of changing, while also looking forward with imagination and curiosity to what the future could hold.

Macau is a vibrant destination that blends Portuguese and Chinese cultures, famous for its dazzling casinos, luxurious resorts, and unique Macanese cuisine. An autonomous region on the south coast of China, across the Pearl River Delta from Hong Kong, Macau was a Portuguese territory until 1999. The region offers a captivating mix of old and new. As such, it is an ideal location in which to 'reimagine the future'!


On World Choral Day, let us raise our voices—in song, in solidarity, and in hope. Sing for peace. Sing for our planet. Sing for our future.

Peer-to-Peer Conductors Beyond Borders Exchange Programme

The Peer-to-Peer Conductors Beyond Borders (CBB) Exchange Programme is part of the Choral TIES project coordinated by the European Choral Association, co-funded by the European Union Creative Europe programme, and organised in cooperation with IFCM. Thank you to all the participating partners! Here's a peek into some of the November exchanges made possible through the Peer-to-Peer CBB Exchange Programme.

7-10 November: A European conductor from outside the EU (Kerry Boyle, UK) hosted by several choirs in the region of Reims, France

The villages in and around Reims have struggled to recover since the pandemic. Like many places post-Covid, choir numbers remain very low and choirs are looking for new members. To

help revitalise local participation, the villagers invited neighbouring choirs to join and perform at a social event. The choirs were led by Kerry Boyle, who also provided a preparatory workshop for the choirs.



13-16 November: A European conductor (Rudolf de Beer, Norway) hosted by a Department of Education Institution in South Africa (North West Musikon)

During this CBB Peer-to-Peer Exchange Program session, Rudolf de Beer undertook several professional engagements that contributed meaningfully to his artistic development. He led a workshop with Viva Cantare Choir, a choir from Stellenbosch, providing technical and musical guidance to support the ensemble's ongoing growth. Rudolf also served as guest conductor for a new choral-orchestral project with Musikon in Klerksdorp, collaborating closely with local musicians on the preparation and interpretation of the repertoire.



13-17 November: A conductor from outside Europe (Maria Guinand, Venezuela) hosted by choral conductors in Finland (Global Music Department at Uniarts Helsinki)

This CBB Peer-to-Peer Exchange Program session aimed to strengthen global choral leadership by exploring vocal work within an intercultural rhythmic choir. It covered rhythmic conducting techniques across diverse musical cultures, vocal groove, group voice teaching, workshop and rehearsal methods, planning, body–rhythm integration, choral improvisation, and creative approaches to choir direction.













IFCM recommends: Connect & Create - Strengthening Cultural Ties Between Africa and Europe

Connect & Create is the Sub-Saharan Africa branch of the EU-funded Africa-Europe Partnerships for Culture programme. Led by the <u>Goethe-Institut</u> and <u>Expertise France</u>, in partnership with the <u>Institut français</u>, it seeks to renew and strengthen cultural ties between Sub-Saharan Africa



and the European Union through equity, inclusion, and sustainability.

Launched in 2025 in Addis Ababa and Zanzibar, the initiative embodies the Team Europe spirit, combining the expertise of the three partner institutions. It promotes a collaborative, artist-centered approach, positioning culture not only as a means of outreach but also as a transformative force for genuine cooperation, creativity, and mutual respect.

IFCM Signed Policy Recommendations from the Cultural and Creative Sectors on the Future of EU-UK Cultural Relations

The <u>Policy Recommendations</u> are addressed to EU and UK institutions, including the EU–UK Parliamentary Partnership Assembly (PPA). They evolved from a recent forum in Brussels where EU and UK cultural organisations discussed key issues such as mobility, transnational funding, cross-border collaboration, regulation, and innovation.

The document will be shared with UK and European Parliament members attending the next PPA meeting, which will focus on strengthening UK–EU cultural and creative exchange.

Concerts take place in the city's most prestigious halls, including the Golden Hall of the Musikverein and the Great Hall of the Konzerthaus, while workshops and lectures are hosted at the University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna (MDW). Open to choirs, bands, and orchestras, the 2026 edition, themed "We are children just the same – child composers over the centuries", celebrates intercultural exchange and musical excellence.



Summa Cum Laude on Tour South Africa 2026

Building on the success of the Summa Cum Laude Festival in Vienna, <u>SCLonTour</u> brings its global youth music experience to new horizons. The first edition will be held 6-11 August 2026 in Sun City, South Africa, featuring performances, competitions, and workshops with international professionals. Highlights include the Inkululeko Ngomculu Parade, a traditional African drumming circle, and an exclusive safari game drive in Pilanesberg National Park. Ensembles may also extend their stay to perform in Cape Town's historic City Hall. SCLonTour unites young musicians worldwide through music, friendship, and intercultural exchange on extraordinary stages across the globe.
